








COVID-19 Updates in RED

Goals

- Obtain tools to support and facilitate communication and relationship-building with child clients
- Understand developmental context for communication with children and teens



Preparation

- Consider age and developmental level
- Find out what the child may already know
- Check in about how the child is doing
- Focus on building a trusting relationship
- Determine means of communication

Time, Time, Time

- Building trust may take multiple meetings
 - During the pandemic, those meetings may be shorter but more often
- Be consistent and follow through
- A child's presentation can vary on different days, at different times, and in different settings

Collateral Information

 You may need to rely on collateral information about a child from caregivers, teachers, therapists and others

And that is OK!

Safe Space

- Productive communication requires safety
- How do I build safe physical space?
- How do I promote safe emotional space?

Awareness

- Who is in the room?
 - You
 - The child
 - The caregivers
 - Experiences



Communication

- Play
- Invite children to talk and engage
- Be an active listener
- Remember your body language
- Clarify
- Empathize

Language

- Adapt the child's language
- Use words appropriate for age and developmental level
- Assure a shared meaning of words
- Ask open-ended questions

Teens

- Direct communication
- Authenticity
- Power dynamics
- Change of scenery
 - Take a walk, out for coffee
- Boundaries
- Manage expectations and follow through

Tools

- Uno card deck
- Playdough
- Puppets, dolls, stuffed animals
- Matchbox cars
- Slinkies or other fidget toys
- Crayons and paper (draw a house, draw your family)
- Scavenger Hunt
- Feelings Guessing Game





Sample Case Referral - Nadine

What is the current custodial arrangement? If a party's contact with the child(ren) has been restricted, please state basis.

The child is in the mother's custody right now.

Is there a pendente lite custody order or other custody order in place? If so, what are the provisions of the order? Please provide the latest substantive order issued.

Procedural posture of the case (e.g., motion to modify custody filed):

Complaint for Custody pending before the Court.

Describe a compelling reason for GAL request (e.g., domestic violence, allegations of physical or sexual abuse or neglect, withholding of child from one party, child or parties have physical or mental health needs, child testimony issue, teen parents, de facto parent):

Judge Justice would like a GAL to speak with the child, Nadine. She's 8 years old and is afraid to visit with the father or even be in the same room with him. It is clear to the Court that the mother does not want these visits to take place. The Court questioned the mother extensively regarding a reason why the child would be so adamant about not wanting to visit with the father but still has little insight into the reasons for the child's reluctance. The father denies the mother's allegations that he has threatened and harassed her. The father has yet to see Nadine because of her refusal to visit him. The Court also wants Nadine to attend the next court hearing.

Have home studies and/or psychological evaluations been ordered for any of the parties? If so, when? If ordered, have they been submitted to the court for review? Has mediation been attempted? If so, when?

Home studies were ordered on November 25, 2019 but have not been completed. The father now lives in Maryland and the court would like information about his home

 During one of your first meetings with Nadine, she tells you that she once witnessed her dad shove her mom into a wall.


Case Study - Questions

- Was this a one-time incident or part of a larger pattern of behavior? Are there indications of a pattern of coercivecontrolling behavior such as social isolation, control of financial resources, stalking?
- Has he ever been physically abusive toward Nadine? What is his approach to discipline? His parenting/discipline style?
- What is the father's perspective on this incident or any past incidents of violence with mom? Does he show insight? Does he continue to justify the behavior?
- What is the current level of fear or risk of further incidents?

What is Domestic Violence?

- Power and Control Through Fear and Abuse
 - Physical Abuse
 - Verbal Abuse
 - Sexual Abuse
 - Isolation
 - Coercion
 - Harassment
 - Economic Control

- Intimidation & Threats
- Emotional Withholding
- Property Destruction
- Self Destructive Behavior



 Abusive-controlling violent relationships/Intimate terrorism

Violent resistance

Situational couple violence

Domestic Violence in Practice

- Allegations are common in high conflict custody matters
- Next steps when accusations are made:
 - Be aware of signs in the children
 - Observations/targeted questions
 - Consult with records, family/friends, and professionals with knowledge of the family
 - Consult with experts in domestic violence


Risks to Children

- Intuitive dangers of violence
- Increased risk of child maltreatment

Disruption to the attachment and bonding

process

- Cyclical nature of DV
- Lifelong implications



Signs of Exposure

- Regression
- Clinginess
- Violent play
- Eating, sleeping problems
- School absences and academic difficulty
- Behavioral/mood changes
- Somatic complaints
- Substance abuse, high-risk behaviors (older children)


Characteristics of Survivors & Abusers

Survivors

- Mostly women
- Ages 18 to 24
- Studies have found no correlation between personality type and being a victim

Abusers

- Deny or make light of the abuse
- Blame the victim
- May express remorse
- Can be smart, witty, charming people, and at times, loving parents



In the United States:

- 1 in 3 women have been physically abused by an intimate partner
- Intimate partner violence accounts for 15 percent of violent crime
- 1 in 15 children are exposed to intimate partner violence annually; 90 percent of these children are eyewitnesses

Substance Abuse

Case Study

 In Nadine's case, dad tells you that mom has a marijuana problem. Mom tells you the same thing about dad.

Case Study - Questions

- Have you seen any evidence of substance use in either home? Is there any other collateral evidence of a substance use problem?
- Is there any evidence that substance use is impacting parenting?
- Has Nadine ever reported any concerns of substance use by her parents?
- Might there be unaddressed mental health concerns that could indicate a concern for substance abuse?

Substance Abuse in Practice

 Cross-allegations of substance abuse are common, and are often unfounded

Consult with professionals regarding assessment and treatment

Abuse vs. Addiction

Substance Abuse The use of a substance to the extent that it negatively impacts one's functioning in various domains.

Addiction, or Substance Dependence

 A complex illness characterized by intense and, at times, uncontrollable drug craving, along with compulsive drug seeking and use that persist even in the face of devastating consequences. (NIH)

Indicators of Substance Abuse

Reports from caregivers, child(ren) or others

Paraphernalia

Observed changes in mood and behavior

Financial stress

Difficulties with work and relationships

Criminal behavior

Impact on Children

- Prenatal development
- Delays in emotional and physical development
- Disruption to bonding process
- Academic difficulties
- Lack of supervision
- Parentification
- Social stigma
- Child maltreatment

Step one: Assessment

Addressing Substance Abuse Problems

Possible treatment:

- Inpatient
- Outpatient
- Medication
- Mutual self-help groups
- Treatment for co-occurring disorders

Assessing Recovery

- Timeline of substance use
- "Rock bottom" and demonstrated desire to change
- Triggers
- People, Places, Things
- Treatment and after-care plan/support



Child Abuse and Neglect

Case Study

 Nadine tells you that once, her dad forgot to pick her up from her karate class and left her standing outside. She says it's one reason she believes he is a bad father.

Case Study - Questions

- Is this part of a larger pattern by dad, or a one-time incident? Is there a CPS history in this case? Does this rise to the level of neglect?
- Emotional perception vs reality was this a severe incident where the karate instructor had to call CPS because he couldn't locate dad, or a communication problem that was resolved?
- What is the context in which Nadine reports this to you?

Emotional Maltreatment

Allegations of abuse/neglect are common

Abuse/Neglect in Practice

Remember: It is not necessarily your role to make a determination as to whether maltreatment occurred

Allegations of abuse by adults are different than disclosures of abuse by your client



Stay calm, your initial response to disclosure is important

If A Child Discloses



Ask open-ended questions to gather information



Consult with your supervisor or CLC mentor on next steps

What Happens When Maltreatment is Reported to Child and Family Services Agency (CFSA)?

- A hotline worker will gather as much information as possible
- CFSA determines response
- Investigations:
 - Unfounded / Inconclusive
 - Substantiated



A Note About Resilience



- Each child responds differently to maltreatment, parental substance abuse, and domestic violence
- The degree of signs and symptoms of adversity in children will vary
- Resiliency in children and youth plays an important role in a child's response to adversity
