### **Overview**

#### **Collaboratives**

There are five Collaboratives operating in the District of Columbia. Each Collaborative is an independent 501(c)(3) led by a community-based board of directors. The Collaboratives are:

- Columbia Heights/Shaw Family Support Collaborative
- East River Family Strengthening Collaborative
- Edgewood/Brookland Family Support Collaborative
- Far Southeast Family Strengthening Collaborative
- Georgia Avenue Family Support Collaborative

In addition, youth can receive aftercare services from Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of D.C. (<a href="http://casadc.org/">http://casadc.org/</a>).

#### Vision/Mission

Each Collaborative draws on the unique capabilities and services found within its network of service providers to assist at-risk children and families. There is a set of core neighborhood-based prevention services that each Collaborative provides.

The Collaboratives' vision is to develop and sustain a seamless network of community partners throughout the District of Columbia that work to build strong families and supportive communities in which children, youth, and adults can safely and productively reside and thrive. The Collaboratives base their work with children and families on the shared principles listed below.

- Commitment to children
- Respect for families
- Community partnership
- High quality, flexible, and responsive services
- Accountability

#### How Youth Get Referred to the Collaborative

For aging out youth, the social worker should refer the youth to aftercare services (through the collaboratives or through CASA), when the youth is 19 ½ years old. The youth is then eligible for services for two calendar years after their 21st birthday. *See* Child and Family Services Agency Policy, "Older Youth Services", April 29, 2014.

**"Family Services**": goal is to reduce out-of-home placements for children in order to keep families together; maximize family self-sufficiency; and reduce the number of substantiated child abuse and neglect cases. Divisions:

- 1) Investigation and Referral for community services (\*for individuals who have elected not to receive case management through collaborative or are not eligible for collaborative services)
- 2) Community General: provides intensive, home-based case management services to families to prevent involvement with the child welfare system (families are not yet actively involved with the child welfare system)
- 3) Community Diverted: provides intensive, home-based case management services to families who have initially come into contact with the child welfare system, but were assessed to be low-to-moderate risk of child maltreatment
- 4) Short Term Crisis Support: during CPS investigation to stabilize family/ prevent removal. Services (i.e. rent/utility assistance; short-term housing accommodations; food provision) are provided for up to 30 days.
- 5) System Transformation: case management/housing relocation for homeless families with children that previously resided in temporary family shelters in D.C.

"Community Services Division": aim is to increase capacity/participation/knowledge of community and service providers in prevention of child abuse and neglect.

**Youth Aftercare Program (YAP):** youth aged 16-21 that will age out of D.C. foster care within six months or less. Must be moving to or currently residing in Ward 8. Social worker must submit referral. Services provided:

- Case management (assessment of needs/development of action plan/monitoring of service delivery and engagement/advocacy/documented case progress)
- Employment development
- Housing resources
- Vocational training
- Post-secondary education resources
- Life skills management
- Referrals for mental health services

**Rapid Housing Program**: short term housing subsidies for families whose lack of affordable housing is the main barrier to family stabilization/children exiting foster care AND youth transitioning out of foster care. Program provides case management, budget management, rental subsidy, household maintenance, and family stabilization/self-sufficiency. Referring social worker or family support worker must complete intake

**Digital Connectors**: assists youth ages 14-21 who attend Ward 8 schools in exploring careers in technology, telecommunications, and digital arts

**Care Coordination and Diversion Program** (referrals from DBH): provide service to families with children with mental health issues (family assessment/teaming/advocacy/visitation/services/support)

**Men and Boys Program:** to be eligible, must have children under the age of 18 that live within a 20 mile radius of D.C.; available to non-custodial fathers. Services provided:

- Case management
- Fatherhood Educational Empowerment Development (FEED)
- WatchDog DADS
- Quenching the Father's Thirst Fatherhood Empowerment Program

Milestones Supervised Visitation Program: available to family involved with CFSA with court-ordered visitation

**Partnership for Community-Based Services:** collaboration with CFSA to provide services for families in CFSA involved cases

**Short Term Crisis:** intensive services provided to families during CPS investigation
